Labs will be due on the Sunday at 11:59 pm 6 days following the assigning of the lab assignment. No late lab assignments will be accepted. Attendance will be taken during lab for extra credit points to be added to that week's lab assignment.

Homework assignments will be turned in electronically. Late assignments will be accepted with the following late penalties:

One day late	10% penalty
Two days late	30% penalty
Three days late	60% penalty
Four or more days late	100% penalty (score will be a zero)

If you have any questions regarding how any homework assignment, lab assignment or test is graded and you think that you deserve more points than you received, you must see the instructor about this within one week of the time the assignment is first returned to the class.
